Celebrations for this year's holiday, the longest and most significant within the Chinese culture, kicked-off on Jan. 31 and will run 15 days, when the moon is at its brightest. This marks the 4712 year, as well as the year of the horse on the Chinese lunar calendar. Individuals born in this year are believed to be cheerful, skillful with money, perceptive, witty, talented and good with their hands. Much of the U.S. renditions of revelry involve both lantern festivals and a choreographed dragon dance.
